Required Duties



One reason our board and tuition is kept at a minimum is due to everyone’s participation in dish-crew, designated work hours, and monthly/yearly room clean-up.

Dishcrew

- All dorm residents will be assigned to a dishcrew. Dishcrews will be posted on the bulletin board. Captains will be designated and are responsible for seeing that all crew members are on the job at the appointed time.
- If a dishcrew is missed, the captain must notify Miss Krieva, and demerits will be given.
- Dishcrews rotate on a daily basis.
- Dishcrew captains must be notified of all dishcrew changes (swapping).
- The cost of replacement or repair of broken dishes or kitchen equipment as a result of carelessness will be required of the person responsible.

Designated Work Hours

All students will be required to work a minimum of four hours per week. (From time to time, international students may be asked to work extra to help as special needs arise.) Careless use of equipment or vehicles during work hours will result in your being responsible for repair or replacement.

Work Week

As stated above, we try to keep tuition costs to a minimum. To help in this, the last week of every school year is designated as a work week. It is mandatory that all students work daily to clean and repair the campus before leaving for the summer. Details will be given near the end of the year.

Year-end Room Inspection

- A detailed list of cleaning and maintenance requirements will be distributed at the beginning of work week. All rooms must be cleaned and repaired during that week. If repairs are deemed non-negligent, materials and repairs will be done by EI. Cost for negligent damages will be deducted from the room deposit, but work will be done by EI.
- To avoid loss of deposit, a staff member must sign and date a checklist confirming that all cleaning and repair work has been completed before each student departs. Once this is done, the staff member will notify the business office to release the room deposit. If a student leaves without having the proper paper signed, all cleaning and repair will be performed at the hourly rate of \$30/hour.
- Students* may leave after graduation (if their room has been inspected and approved) and must be out after the graduation reception.

*International students must check their work schedule.

- New light bulbs are stored in the cleaning closet in Dorm A. Plastic study lamps require 100-watt bulbs. Goose-neck study lamps (Dorm D) and wall fixtures use 60-watt bulbs.
- In accordance with fire codes, all dormitory hallways are to be completely free of personal items at all times.
- Candles and incense should not be burned in dorm rooms or bathrooms. Candles with an unburned wick may be used for decorative purposes only.
- The need for room repairs should be reported to Mr. Cook. Please fill out a problem report card found on the bulletin board.
- Students are financially responsible for any damage to their rooms or furnishings not caused by normal usage.
- Paint and Air-soft guns may not be shot in or around the dorms.

Monthly Room Inspection

Rooms will be thoroughly inspected once a month (men's rooms every last Thursday and women's rooms every last Friday). The following items must be done before inspection:

- Beds made
- Furniture, windowsills, and ceiling vents dusted
- Waste cans emptied
- Carpet vacuumed, bathroom floor mopped
- Windows (inside and out) and mirrors cleaned
- Bathroom fixtures cleaned
- Sink stoppers removed and cleaned
- Shower curtain cleaned
- Cabinet fronts and tops cleaned
- Walls and doors cleaned (free of smudges and water spots)
- Air conditioners cleaned
- Blinds dusted (where applicable)
- Slat doors (in Dorms B, C, and D) dusted
- Cleaning supplies are kept in the supply room on the second floor of Dorm A and should be returned immediately.
- A vacuum is designated for each dorm and should not be removed except for needed repairs. Do not service or empty bags on vacuum cleaners. If not functioning properly, please take the vacuum cleaner to the shop and inform Laura.

Telephones

WARNING: All of the phones in dorm rooms are digital. Plugging in a modem could damage your modem or the phone system and will NOT connect through to the internet.

- If you have any problems/questions about your phone or voicemail, please call Mr. Morris (4908).
- All phone calls (dorm phones or cell phones) should be completed by 10:00 p.m. (10:30 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays). Only extreme emergency calls may be made or received after 10:00 p.m.
- Long-distance calls must be made by using phone cards, calling collect, or using personal cell phones.

Care of Rooms

- Rooms should be kept reasonably neat and orderly at all times.
- Rooms will be generally inspected each Friday morning (women) and Thursday morning (men) during first period. Demerits will be given for areas that are not clean and neat (beds made, clothes hung, trash emptied, carpets vacuumed, spots cleaned, etc.).
- In order to prevent damage to walls, carpets and doorways, the moving of ANY (EI or personal) furniture must be supervised by a staff member or intern. During work week, all furniture must be placed back in its original position.
- Pins or thumbtacks may be used to attach a small number of appropriate items to walls. There should be no more than 6 holes per room. Items must be completely removed and walls cleaned for the year-end room inspection.
- All furniture must be at least one inch from the walls.
- Any food in the room must be stored in an airtight container. Crumbs and spills should be cleaned up immediately.
- Only coffee pots with an automatic shut-off feature are allowed in the dorms. They should be kept on the sink or on a personal piece of furniture so water and/or heat does not damage any of the desks or bed shelving.

Sickness

- Illnesses/injuries must be reported to the Dean of Men or Dean of Women immediately. Permission must be obtained from them if it is necessary to be absent from lectures, volleyball, or prayer meetings for medical reasons. (Please call before 8:15 a.m.)
- In order to prevent spreading an illness, students with fever should remain in their rooms the entire day. Your roommate will bring meals to your room. No visitors will be permitted.
- If any of the required scheduled morning activities are missed for illness, you may not play volleyball and must remain in your room for the entire day. If a student is sick on his/her workday, he/she will need to make arrangements for a replacement (when necessary) and a make-up day.
- If a student is injured and cannot play volleyball, he/she will be assigned work during that hour. Please see the Dean of Men or Dean of Women for job assignments. Special consideration will be made for those with long-term injuries.

Laundry Rooms

- Laundry Rooms in Dorm B are for Staff/Housekeeping use only.
- Because we are on a septic system, only non-phosphate laundry detergents may be used. No chlorine bleaches may be used. Detergent should not be left in laundry rooms.
- In order to keep laundry machines available for others, laundry should not be left in washers or dryers when finished, but should be quickly removed.
- Laundry machines should not be used after 10:00 p.m.

Meals

- Everyone is expected to be on time for meals.
- Demerits will not be given for being late to breakfast or lunch, but all students must be through the food line by 7:50 a.m. for breakfast and 1:30 p.m. for lunch.
- Sitting at assigned tables is required for lunch and dinner Monday through Friday. Table assignments will be posted on the bulletin board every Monday.
- If a meal is to be missed, students must sign out one meal ahead (before the number of sign outs is circled). Once you have signed out, you are ineligible to eat that meal.
- Health Department regulations require washed hands for all who enter the kitchen.
- Under no circumstances is the thermostat in the dining area to be altered.
- Only the brown or green glasses may be taken from the dining room. No other dishes or silverware should be removed.

Mail & Mailboxes

- Letters may be placed in the mail basket in the Mail Room. They will be picked up for mailing daily during first period.
- Mail will be distributed to the mailboxes located in the Mail Room daily.
- Small packages will be left in the Mail Room for pick up. For a larger, heavier package, the recipient will be notified to pick up the package at the Business Office.
- Students are responsible to mail their own packages.
- Please empty your mailbox often; it is not to be used as a storage area.

Holidays

- Attendance is required at all classes the day before a holiday begins.
- Students may leave after volleyball on the last day of classes.**
- Lunch on the last day of classes will be the last meal served.
- All students must leave before 8:00 p.m. on the last day of classes unless otherwise permitted.
- Anyone permitted to remain, but unable to leave before 12:00 noon on the first day of the holiday, is required to work 4 hours before leaving.
- Anyone returning *before* 12:00 noon on the last day must also work 4 hours.
- The first meal served after each of the holiday periods will be breakfast the day classes resume. Those who return early must provide for their own meals.
- Those with permission to remain on campus over a holiday must work 4 hours per day for room and board.

**International students will be assigned certain holidays to remain on campus.

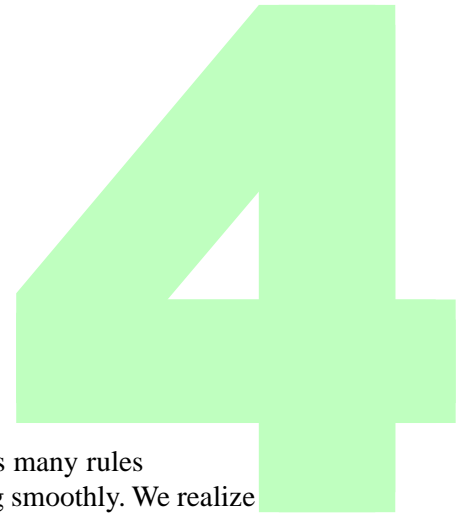

Dorm Life



We have made every effort to have only as many rules as are required to keep campus life running smoothly. We realize on rare occasions there may be a need for a student to request exemption. Any request for special permission to exempt yourself from a rule should be directed to the Dean of Men (for men) and the Dean of Women (for women).

Leaving Campus

In order to reach/find you in case of an emergency, all students must sign out in the notebook provided in the mail room when leaving campus, stating their destination, telephone number (if possible), and estimated time of return. This includes leaving for church and weekends away. Signing in upon return is also required.

Weekend Away

- Each student may leave for one weekend a month. The weekend may begin after volleyball Friday and end no later than 8:30 a.m. Monday morning.
- Any student leaving is responsible for making any necessary arrangements for work duties. Arrangements for dishcrew responsibilities should be made with Miss Krieva.
- Any student returning on Sunday must be in the dorm by 10:00 p.m. If this is not possible, the student should wait until after 6:30 a.m. Monday morning to return to campus.
- A weekend away means staying off campus. Students on campus may NOT absent themselves from the Saturday morning prayer meeting or regular Sunday worship services.

If leaving for a break, see Holidays on page 7 for guidelines.

assist in this process. Therefore, situations in which students voluntarily seek help will generally be handled differently than situations in which a lifestyle problem has come to our attention through the demerit system.

If a student thinks a demerit should be revoked, men should discuss it with the Dean of Men and women should discuss it with the Dean of Women within 48 hours of receipt.

Guests & Visitors

- Permission for guests must be obtained from the Dean of Men or Women.
- At least one week's notice should be given.
- Parents may stay overnight as our guests once per year.
- Prospective students may stay as guests for two nights. During these times, meals are free of charge.
- If these desire to return (or other family/friends visit), charges will be as follows:

Rooms: (includes breakfast, lunch, and dinner for one day)
 One empty room (up to two people) - \$45
 One room with bedding/towels provided - \$55

Meals:

Children 5 and under are free of charge.

Ages 6-12

Breakfast/Lunch/Dinner \$2

Dinner* \$3

Ages 13+

Breakfast \$3

Lunch/Dinner \$4

Dinner* \$6

*"Dinner" is defined as the main meal of the day.

Alumni:

- Alumni may stay on campus at the regular price per room.
- If staying with a student/intern, alumni are required to abide by the Student Handbook.
- If staying with a student/intern, alumni are required to work 4 hours/day or pay \$32/day. Both options include meals.

Any other person desiring to attend meals may do so for the prices listed above, if approved by Miss Krieva.

Meetings & Outside Activities

- Attendance at the Wednesday evening and Saturday morning prayer times is mandatory.
- Any school meeting or activity takes precedence over any outside meeting or activity.
- Any meeting of the entire student body on or off campus must be authorized by the dean of men or women.

Use of Library

- Books may be checked out for a two-week time period. Books in the reference section may be checked out for 24 hours.
- Return books to library desk.
- Personal items (books, notebooks, papers, etc.) must not be left in the library.
- The library is for study, not fellowship. Please refrain from talking to respect the study time of others.
- Desk lamps should be turned off when leaving.
- Food and drinks should not be taken into the computer/library area.

Use of Retreat Center

The Retreat Center is used to receive guests and for special events. Because guests could walk in at any time or meetings with guests could occur at any time, anyone using the RC should behave accordingly.

- Students using the RC may wear casual clothing, but should appear neat, clean, and unwrinkled.
- Students may use the RC kitchen. Food may be kept in the kitchen, but the refrigerator may not be used for storing personal items. Everything should be cleaned and put away after use.
- Only drinks with lids may be taken out of the kitchen (with the exception of red-colored drinks, which may never be taken out of the kitchen).

- Students using the RC should sit properly; no laying or sleeping on the couches. Pillows may not be removed from couches or placed on the floor.

Use of Computer Lab

- Computers which are the property of EI should be treated as such.
- EI computers should only be used for homework, Bible study, and e-mail. Playing games is not permitted.
- Do not attempt to “fix” the computer in any way. If the computer is not working properly, please notify Mr. Morris (4908). If he is unavailable, leave a message.
- Food and drinks should not be taken into the computer/library area.

Purchasing CDs

The student discount price for CDs is \$3 each. Send your order to media@eibibleschool.org. The CD and bill will be placed in your mailbox. Please go to the Business Office to make payments.

Personal Vehicles

- Students should park their cars in the main parking lot.
- To use the garage for repairs or maintenance of vehicles, approval from Mr. Sterr must be obtained.

Off-Campus Jobs

You must inform your respective Dean if you have an off-campus job. Your schedule needs to be approved by the Dean. We recommend a maximum of 20 hours off-campus work per week.

Music

- Any audio device must be used with headphones “on ears” so that others cannot hear.
- Only Christian and classical music may be played on campus.
- No one may use the piano or organ in the auditorium without first obtaining permission from the Dean of Men or Dean of Women.
- Musical instruments may be played only in the downstairs classroom (below deck in Dorm D) or in the auditorium.

Off-Limit Areas

- Walkways should be used at all times except during emergencies.
- Students may not use unassigned rooms.
- The auditorium may not be used as a study area.
- Shop/garage equipment and tools may not be used without permission from Mr. Sterr.
- The kitchen is off-limits at all times (including weekends). This includes the icemaker and the refrigerator unless permission is given.
- The dining room phone (678-4810) should be used to make/receive personal phone calls. The kitchen phone should not be used.
- Men and women should never be in the other’s dorm areas. The only exceptions would be for maintenance (when a man should announce his presence).
- The fire escape porch and ladder (Dorm D) is for use only in the case of a fire and is off-limits at all other times.

Demerits

We believe the Lord has sent each student to us. We want to challenge you to grow personally, spiritually, emotionally, and intellectually. The guidelines set forth in this handbook are designed to aid in this process.

Every effort is made to make correction a positive experience. If a student is struggling with any issue or behavior and demonstrates a serious desire for change by asking for help, the staff is committed to

- “Lights out” means head on pillow attempting sleep.
- Avoid practical jokes. The obligation to “get even” always results in pranks increasing in number and intensity. This may mean anger or injury to some, more clean-up work for the staff, and a distraction for everyone.
- The game and weight rooms may not be used during designated study times, prayer and fasting days, or on Sundays.
- Public areas (library, dining room, classrooms, mail room, retreat center, auditorium) must be kept neat and free of personal items (books, clothing, instruments). Any items left will be picked up and placed in the lost and found bin in the Dorm A laundry room.
- School vehicles may not be used without permission from a staff member.
- For their own safety, women may not run or take walks off campus when it is dark.
- Do not sit or climb on the guardrails. Clothing or personal items should not be hung on railings.
- Lights should be turned off when leaving your dorm room.
- Food or drinks (except water) should not be taken into the auditorium.

Important: Please keep to the speed limits on the roads around the campus for the sake of neighborhood children and our testimony as a Bible school.

Movie Viewing

We realize there is a wide variety of opinion within the Christian community regarding what is appropriate. Movies can, at times, provide wholesome entertainment. However, the majority reflect views and lifestyles that are in direct opposition to a Christ-centered life. Therefore, viewing of videos and DVDs (or any downloaded visual entertainment) is not appropriate on campus at any time. We trust you to honor this policy.

Computer Games

Only computer games with a rating of EC or E should be played on campus.

Community Living Standards

Quiet Time

One of our main goals is to help young people cultivate a closer relationship with Jesus Christ; therefore, we believe that your quiet time in the morning is a very important part of training and spiritual growth.

- On Monday through Friday, all students must sign in and proceed with their quiet times.
- Each person must personally sign in no later than 6:30 a.m. (Don't ask others to sign for you.)

Dress

- Dress is expected to be neat, modest, and appropriate for the occasion. We reserve the right to deal with any dress we deem inappropriate.
- Shoes should be worn at all times.
- Dirty or muddy shoes should not be worn into any of the buildings.
- Dress at meals should always be neat and clean.

Classes- Students are expected to dress up for class.

- Clothing with graphic pictures and/or words is not appropriate. (A small logo is fine.)
- T-shirts and shorts are not appropriate.
- Men may wear buttoned-up and collared shirts, nice pants (no blue jeans, baggy cargo pants, or athletic pants), socks and shoes (no sandals or flip-flops).
- Women may wear nice pants, skirts or dresses (no blue-jeans or athletic pants), no plastic flip-flops. A nice blue-jean skirt is acceptable.

Women

- All clothing must be LOOSE (with extra room, not tight or form-fitting). Shorts should be no shorter than 2 inches above the knee. Any woman wearing clothing the staff deems too tight will be sent back to her room to change.

- Dresses/skirts must be to the bottom of the knee. Slits in skirts are to be no higher than 2 inches above the knee.
- Tank tops are not appropriate. (Sleeveless tops are acceptable.)
- Sleepwear may not be worn out of the dorm room.

Men

- Longer shorts (with an inseam of at least 8 inches) are appropriate general campus attire.
- Athletic shorts (with an inseam of at least 6 inches) are appropriate for participation in sports only.
- Undershirts, tank shirts, and shirts with oversized armholes are not appropriate at any time. Men must wear shirts any time they are outside of their dorm rooms.
- Beards and mustaches must be trimmed.
- Headwear should not be worn in the dining hall, classrooms, or auditorium.

Men/Women Relationships

- A car may not be occupied by only one man and one woman.
- Men and women may not touch at any time on or off campus (even in jest or teasing). The only appropriate touch would be a handshake in greeting. Touching at any other time may be subject to disciplinary measures. Any type of sexual contact will result in the immediate expulsion of both parties. A man and woman should only be alone in visible, public areas.

Believing the Lord has brought you here first and foremost to know Him, we don't encourage the pursuit of relationships because of the resulting distraction from your clearly defined objective. However, if a young man or woman has prayerfully considered a fellow student as a serious relationship possibility, he/she must talk with the Dean of Men or Dean of Women. At that time, appropriate measures will be discussed based on their parents' approval, etc.

Church Attendance

A list of churches has been included in the registration packet. You may choose to visit several before making a final decision concerning which will become your "home church" during your time here.

Each student will be required to commit to a church in writing. After the specified date, only attendance at that church will be permissible unless special permission is given by the Dean of Men or Dean of Women. Attendance at morning and evening services is mandatory.* Failure to attend will result in loss of the privilege to choose a church. Each person is responsible to make sure he/she has transportation.

Dress for church is discretionary, but PLEASE remember that you are representatives of EI wherever you go (church or otherwise). We request that you dress/ behave in an appropriate manner, reflective of the school's standards.

Wednesday evenings are reserved for on-campus meetings, so church attendance will not be possible. On these evenings, we will meet together for a special emphasis on missions and prayer.

*If your church has no regular evening service, you should choose a church to regularly attend in the evenings.

General Conduct

- Please remember that the principle of consideration of others applies at all times.
- Talking, inappropriate laughter, and distracting actions are inappropriate classroom behavior.
- No food is allowed in the classroom.
- All staff members need to be addressed as Mr., Mrs., or Miss. Interns, however, may be addressed by their first name.
- Sunday will be observed as the Lord's Day, a day of rest, during which no one may study, play games, engage in sports, or launder clothes on campus.
- Prayer and Fasting is not a day off, but is a time for quiet reflection before the Lord.
- "Study Sessions" should be times conducive to study. No action/ activity should interfere with another's ability to study during these times.
- "In Dorm" times should be conducive to relaxation/sleep. No action/ activity (slamming doors, loud conversation/laughter, use of phone, etc.) should interfere with another's ability to rest during these times.
- Students are responsible to arrange with classmates who have a bank account to cash checks.
